Aldo Robledo
Education Fellow, New York State Youth Leadership Council

Aldo Irving Robledo Garcia is an educator, strategist, and activist who has been advocating for immigrant rights since the age of 16. He is currently a senior at John Jay College majoring in Political Science. Born in Mexico but raised in New York City, Aldo co-founded and coordinates the Undocu Academy, which has been running since early 2020. Undocu Academy is a closed group focused on college access for undocumented high school students.



Areli MoralesCUNY Brooklyn College graduate and author of Areli is a Dreamer

Areli Morales is an award-winning author and educator. She was born in Puebla, Mexico but was raised in New York City. She is a DACA recipient, and Areli is a Dreamer is her debut children's book. Her book has received many accolades such as the Jefferson Cup award, The International Literacy Association (ILA) Children's and Young Adult Book honor, and starred reviews from Kirkus Reviews and Booklist. A graduate of CUNY-Brooklyn College with a bachelor's degree in childhood bilingual education, she currently works as a kindergarten teacher at The Studio School. In her classroom, Areli teaches children to value the power of storytelling and empowers them to share their own stories. She is pursuing a master's degree in Early Childhood Special Education at Brooklyn College. She currently lives in Brooklyn, New York with her family.



Ashleigh ThompsonUniversity Dean for Education, CUNY

Ashleigh Thompson is University Dean for Education at the City University of New York (CUNY). In that role, she oversees Teacher Education across CUNY, a portfolio encompassing more than 16,000 education students pursuing associate to doctoral degrees. Dr. Thompson convenes the Deans and Chairs from CUNY's Schools and Departments of Education, creating and implementing a University-wide strategy for teacher preparation both internally and with outside partners. Dean Thompson directs CUNY's NYC Men Teach initiative, an engagement and recruitment effort of the Mayor's Office aimed to inspire more men of color to become teachers in New York City. She is also Principal Investigator on CUNY's NYC Teaching Fellows partnership with the NYC Department of Education. She leads a diverse array of University-wide Academic Affairs initiatives focused on student access and success.



Carlos Pérez Valle
Project Researcher, CUNY-IIE

Carlos Pérez Valle was born in Tulcingo de Valle, México and moved to New York at the age of three. After high school, he became involved in promoting equitable educational opportunities for low-income and immigrant communities. His leadership allowed him to develop and manage several programs for nonprofit and government organizations. Such work has led him to work for organizations such as the NYC Department of Education, Masa, The Parent-Child Home Program, Breakthrough New York, and various public and charter schools. Carlos received his BA in Speech-Language Pathology & Audiology from CUNY Macaulay Honors College at Lehman, with a minor in Early Childhood Education. He is currently a doctoral student at the School of Communication Sciences & Disorders at McGill University and a Start with Equity fellow for the Children's Equity Project at Arizona State University.

Executive Director, Multilingual & Immigrant Student Supports, Division of Multilingual Learners, NYC Department of Education

Charlene Clarke is a passionate leader focused on youth development, K-16 policies, and strategic partnerships that center equity and access. After being accepted into the Education Program at CCNY and finishing all credits for her Childhood Education major, she was harshly confronted that without qualifying for the DACA program, she was barred from student teaching and thereby completing her degree. She did not qualify for the program due to her arrival date in the United States. She switched gears on her dreams and she graduated with an Interdisciplinary Studies of Arts and Science major from the Center for Worker Education at CCNY in 2018. She is currently pursuing an M.A. in Bilingual Education from CCNY and is expected to graduate this June.



Guadalupe Ambrosio

Associate Investigator for UndocuEdu, CUNY-IIE

Guadalupe Ambrosio is an Associate Investigator for UndocuEdu at CUNY-IIE. She also served as Co-Executive Director of the New York State Youth Leadership Council for six years, an undocumented youth-led organization. She is a long-time community organizer, educator, and strategist. Born in Mexico City and raised in the Bronx. She has over 13 years of experience in community organizing, advocacy, and leadership development. Guadalupe uses her personal experiences, creativity, and passion for education and justice to create spaces and opportunities for immigrant people to

thrive. She earned A.A. degree at BMCC in Bilingual Education and graduated with a B.A. in Sociology with a concentration in immigration from The Colin Powell School for Civic and Global Leadership at CCNY.



Isamar Jiménez-Vázquez Project Researcher, CUNY-IIE

Jesús Pérez
Director of the Immigrant Student Success Office, Brooklyn College

Jesús Pérez is the founding director of the Immigrant Student Success Office (ISSO) at Brooklyn College, a position he has held since 2019. His primary mission has been to assist students in achieving their goal of earning a college degree by providing a comprehensive network of resources. Before leading ISSO, Mr. Pérez served as the director of the Center for Academic Advisement and Student Success (CAASS) for 14 years, where he worked to create a more intentional onboarding process for incoming students and built a more collaborative hand-off process for students to connect to departmental major advisers. He currently serves on the Brooklyn College Black and Latino Male Initiative (BLMI) Advisory Board. He also served as the Executive Director of the CUNY wide Mexican Task Force from 2000 to 2014.



Juan Carlos MercadoDean of the Division of Interdisciplinary Studies, CCNY Center for Worker Education

Juan Carlos Mercado is the Dean of City College Downtown (Division of Interdisciplinary Studies at the Center for Worker Education). Mercado is also Director of the Study Abroad and International Programs at the College, and oversees the Continuing and Professional Studies. Prior to his appointment as Dean, Mercado was Professor and Chair of The Classical and Modern Languages and Literatures at CCNY from 2000 to 2007, and Acting Provost of the College in 2011. After graduating from IHS at LaGuardia, he earned his B.S. in Mathematics and M.A. in Education from Adelphi University. Currently, Juan Carlos has DACA and works at the International High School at Union Square where he is a Math teacher and an Immigrant Liaison. Over the years, he has built partnerships between his school and nonprofit organizations to provide students and families with an array of resources. Juan Carlos has been thrilled to be part of the Immigration Liaison Pilot Program as it has brought him back closer to the educator he envisioned to be.

Maria was the first woman to be President of the BMCC Dream Team while she was a student there and organized the group for an entire academic year. She is also a first-generation college student. Currently, she is finishing her studies at CUNY John Jay College of Criminal Justice majoring in Latin American & Latinx Studies with a minor in Gender Studies. Through her activism in and outside of schools, she has been able to reach hundreds of students to support them in their academic journeys.



Nancy Stern

Co-Principal Investigator, CUNY-IIE and Associate Professor of Bilingual Education and TESOL Programs, The City College of New York

Nancy Stern is Associate Professor in the Programs in Bilingual Education & TESOL at The City College of New York and in the Linguistics Program at the CUNY Graduate Center. Her research is in the fields of theoretical linguistics, teacher education, and bilingualism (including 'On So-Called Spanglish,' 2011, with Ricardo Otheguy). 
Roxana Herrera Project Researcher, CUNY-IIE

She is an active member of the New York State Youth Leadership Council (NYSYLC) and Otros Dreams en Acción (ODA).



Sara P. Álvarez Interim Co-Principal Investigator, CUNY-IIE and Assistant Professor of English, Queens College

Sara P. Alvarez is Assistant Professor of English at Queens College, City University of New York (CUNY) and 2018-2020 Cultivating New Voices Fellow at the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE). Sara's qualitative research focuses on the multilingual and academic writing practices of self-outed U.S. undocumented young adults. Her past research ethnographically examined the multilingual social media literacy practices among second-generation Latina/e youth and their transnational families in Kentucky. Her publications have appeared in the journals Equity and Excellence in Education, World English, Journal of Adolescent & Adult Literacy, among others.
